Project Description:

The city of Barberton proposes to resurface 3,202.6 feet of 2nd Street SW from Hudson Run Road to Wooster Road West and implement a road diet with bike lanes, resurface 3,814.47 feet of Norton Avenue from Barber Road/4th Street NW to Wooster Road North and resurface 1,626.54 feet of Wooster Road North from Norton Avenue/Orchard Avenue to Burt Street in the city of Barberton, Summit County. Additional improvements proposed by the project include partial/full depth pavement repair, curb replacement, curb ramp/detectable warning replacement to comply with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards, sidewalk replacement, underdrain installation, catch basin/manhole adjustment/reconstruction, new traffic sign installation and new pavement marking application.

The proposed 2nd Street SW road diet will maintain the existing roadway width and implement adjusted pavement markings. The existing street has two travel lanes in each direction. The proposed road diet will establish one travel lane in each direction, a two-way center left turn lane and a designated 5-foot wide bike lane in each direction.

Mapping that depicts the project location on United States Geological Survey (USGS) 7.5-Minute Topographic Quadrangle mapping is included in Project File/General/Project Information as USGS Quadrangle Topographical Map.pdf.

A minimum of one 10-foot lane of traffic in each direction shall be maintained on the existing pavement or completed pavement during project construction. Road closures and detours are not proposed to construct the project. Construction and lane restriction/reduction information will be posted within the project construction limits prior to the start of project construction. Access shall be maintained to all adjacent properties, businesses and intersecting side streets during project construction. Substantial traffic disruptions are not expected to construct the project.

The project will be constructed within the existing street rights-of-way.

Existing utilities within the project study areas will not be impacted/relocated to construct the project.

Based on the project scope of work, its Path 1 Project Development Process (PDP) Classification and the proposed maintenance of traffic measures, emergency/public services contact activities were not conducted for the project.

A Cultural Resources Records Check was performed by district environmental staff using the SHPO GIS online database. No Cultural Resources listed on or determined eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places were identified within and/or immediately adjacent to the proposed project area. The undertaking is a type that has minimal potential to cause effects to historic properties. No further coordination is required in accordance with the Section 106 Programmatic Agreement. In accordance with Stipulation V(C)(1) and Appendix A of the Section 106 Programmatic Agreement executed on November 8, 2017 (Agreement No. 19319), amended on July 11, 2019, ODOT determined the project is a type of undertaking that has 'minimal potential to cause effects' to historic properties and is not a part of a larger undertaking. Based on the information in the Regulated Materials Review (RMR) Form completed for the project, further RMR activities or special materials management are not warranted for the project. See the RMR documentation for the project in the Project File/ESA/Reports subsection.

Additionally, this project is considered ecologically exempt under the Ecological MOA (Agreement 19394). See the Ecologically Exempt New ESR 1.pdf for the project in the Project File/Ecological/Reports subsection. ODOT District 4 Environmental Section personnel reviewed the FEMA FIRMs for the project study areas and determined the project is not located within a special flood hazard area.

The project will not impact any environmentally sensitive resources within the project study areas. ODOT District 4 conducted various public involvement activities for the project, including a public engagement flyer mailed to adjacent property owners, a news release issued about the project and project information posted on the ODOT website. Comments were requested by all of the public involvement activities conducted for the project. One comment was received by ODOT District 4 as a result of the public involvement activities conducted for the project. The environmental document and associated studies, as applicable, were approved using the Stage 3 Design plans for the project. A copy of the Stage 3 Design plans for the project is included in the Project File/General/Project Information subsection as Stage 3 Design.pdf.

The estimated total project cost specified in Ellis is 6.0% greater than the total project cost specified in the ODOT State Fiscal Years 2021 - 2024 Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). However, based on the estimated total project cost being less than \$2,999,999 and the additional project cost not exceeding 50% of the total project cost in the STIP, a STIP amendment is not necessary for the project.

This area includes the features associated with the physical footprint of the transportation facility (including the roadway, bridges, interchanges, culverts, drainage, fixed guideways, mitigation areas, etc.) and other areas maintained for transportation purposes such as clear zone, traffic control signage, landscaping, any rest areas with direct access to a controlled access highway, areas maintained for safety and security of a transportation facility, parking facilities with direct access to an existing transportation facility, transit power substations, transit venting structures, and transit maintenance facilities.
